Khaki weed is declared a Class B (growth and spread to be controlled) and Class C (not to be introduced) weed in the Northern Territory


Khaki weed is a declared weed in accordance with the *Weed Management Act 2011.*




Usually found in disturbed areas, lawns, campgrounds and stockyards.

Prostrate, perennial plant

that forms thick mats.




Reddish, trailing stems grow up to 60 cm long.



Leaves grow in opposite pairs of unequal size up to 1-4 cm, and are hairy and rounded with a slight taper at the end.



Flowering time: December to May. Flowers are white and grow in clusters where the leaf joins the stem.



Seeds are very small, yellow and occur in small fruits held within the old flower parts. Form into a straw coloured prickly burr up to 1 cm.
